He is a genuine "Okie" -- The 45th is an Oklahoma national guard division -- I am ersatz -- I joined the 45th in France after service with the 9th Infantry Division in Africa and Sicily.

The 45th already an excellent division, received an infusion of paratroop officers in France, and was officially voted the best infantry division in Europe.

In fact, General Patton said the 45th was not only the best infantry division in Europe, but probably the best Infantry Division in the history of American Arms. So, we can both sport our Thunderbird lapel pins with pride.
