Statement of Senior Commissioner James H. Quello Re: Senior Communications Advisor Rudolfo Baca

In 1997, I appointed Rudy Baca as my Senior Advisor. In addition to providing legal and policy advice on the full range of FCC jurisdiction, Rudy is also responsible for managing Congressional, industrial, inter-departmental, and public relations. In this capacity, Rudy was instrumental in effectuating the numerous Commission items required by the 1996 Telecommunications Act. Rudy is known for his "bottom-line" approach that includes focused legal analysis together with finely-honed policy and political considerations.

Rudy has worked for me since 1993. While I served as FCC Chairman, I initially appointed Rudy to serve as my legal advisor for common carrier issues. Rudy led the FCC team that laid the groundwork for access and transport reform. Subsequently, Rudy has also served as advisor for wireless and international issues. He was responsible for resolving the complex Personal Communications Service (PCS) framework issues, including auction implementation. Rudy was the point man for managing the transition of private radio to Commercial Mobile Radio Service (CMRS) and wireless mobile interconnection issues. Additionally, he was a key advisor to all of the Eighth Floor in revising the satellite licensing procedures (particularly, Low Earth Orbiting [LEOs]) and telecommunications trade policies.
