J. Oscar Frenette has spent his 38-year professional radio career as a reporter and administrator at three Michigan radio stations. From 1950 to 1962, he served in a variety of positions at WEOO Radio in Sault Ste. Marie, where he eventually became station manager. From 1962 to 1967, he served as news director for WPON Radio in Pontiac. Since June 1967, he has been with WJR Radio, where he has earned the reputation as one of the nation's most versatile administrators and on-air personalities.

As Public Affairs Director, Mr. Frenette has been responsible for producing WJR's "Point of View" segment, which provides a forum for community issues presented by concerned citizens. He also administers "Call for Action," WJR's contribution to the national consumer education/assistance program. The station's religious programming also is Mr. Frenette's responsibility.

The "gem" of Mr. Frenette's on-air work has been "Sketches of Life and Things in the Great Lakes Area," for which he has earned the reputation as Michigan's poet of the airwaves. By no means a fanciful preoccupation, "Sketches" has become an important historical and educational feature that consistently presents Michigan and its attributes in a positive light to WJR's large, multi-state audience.

Mr. Frenette has adhered to the highest standard of professionalism throughout his career and has consistently displayed innovation and leadership in both his administrative and on-air work. Rather than become a radio specialist -- an all too common occurrence in the industry -- Mr. Frenette has continually diversified, applying his talents to the full range of radio opportunity. His work as a news and feature writer and reporter and his talents as a documentary producer and presenter have been regularly honored.

His community service efforts, both as a radio administrator and as a concerned citizen, have been consistently recognized. He presently serves on the boards of: New Center Area Council; New Center Foundation; Henry Ford Hospital (Main Campus Board); Detroit Historical Society; Historical Society of Michigan; University/Cultural Center Association; International Freedom Festival; Detroit Children's Library Friends; Friends of the International Institute.

The result of Mr. Frenette's efforts over the past 38 years has been to set a standard for all those in radio, and those who look to radio as a career. He has proven that radio is hard work but that radio also can be fun. He has shown that radio can make a difference and that it is the individual citizen's duty to make a difference. And, he has shown that when properly used, radio can be the valuable public resource it is intended to be.

By every standard of measurement, Oscar Frenette belongs in the Michigan Journalism Hall of Fame -- his creativity, sterling character, award-winning journalistic accomplishments and his years of distinguished service as the "Dean" of WJR news and public affairs merit special distinguished service recognition.

As his former WJR associate, boss and now as an FCC Commissioner, it is a pleasure to recommend Oscar Frenette for this distinctive honor.
