# CONCURRING STATEMENT OF COMMISSIONER JAMES H. QUELLO

IN RE: AT&T Communications Tariff F.C.C. No. 15, Competitive Pricing Plans; Holiday Rate Plan

The Commission finds itself in the rather awkward situation of dealing with a phantom tariff offering to which no one subscribes as a justification for finding unlawful a continuation of the Holiday Rate Plan. MCI discovered, somewhat belatedly, that its offering to Holiday was a general offering available to anyone similarly situated to the Holiday Corporation. See MCI Rebuttal at 45 (December 20, 1988).

Admittedly, we all have a genuine concern that single customer offerings might be found to have negative public policy implications. The fact is that single customer offerings are routinely being made by non-dominant carriers as they aggressively compete for business among the nation's largest telecommunications users.

The record before us in this tariff investigation may obscure more than it reveals. I find it very difficult to determine that the result is incorrect.

Therefore, I concur.



Dear Chase:

I would strongly recommend that you consider Dr. Brian F. Fontes to serve as a commissioner at the Federal Communications Commission. I realize that the White House is close to making final decisions for the three open commissioner positions at the FCC, and my recommendation would not interfere with the current list of candidates. In June, however, the term of Commissioner Patricia Dennis will expire. I am recommending Dr. Fontes as Commissioner Dennis' replacement for the term beginning July 1, 1989.

Before I address the qualifications of Dr. Fontes, there are a few matters that warrant consideration. Most importantly, I know that he supports President Bush. Additionally, the FCC has not had a commissioner with expertise in land mobile communications. Fire, police, and land mobile industries would welcome someone knowledgeable of their services' communication needs. By appointing Dr. Fontes to the FCC, the White House would provide for some continuity in policy development since three of the five commissioners will be new to the Commission. Furthermore, historically, the White House has kept one FCC commissioner position available for a candidate from within the agency.

I recognize that in the last two years, the relationship between the Commission and the Congress has been strained. I am confident Dr. Fontes would be able to improve the FCC's relationship with the Commerce committees in both the House and the Senate. He has experience working with these committees and has the respect of members on both sides of the aisle.

Dr. Fontes has a Ph.D. in Mass Media/Telecommunication from Michigan State University. He has taught at a leading university and has served in various policy making positions at the FCC. He also has served as a member of the U.S. Delegation to the World Administrative Radio Conference for Mobile Communications (1987) held in Geneva, Switzerland. He is knowledgeable in broadcast, cable, and

telephone industry matters, as well as his expertise in mobile communications. He is active in local church and civic associations. Furthermore, I know of no opposition to Dr. Fontes. In fact, I am confident that he would receive overwhelming support. As reported in Communications Magazine, a leader of the land mobile industry, when referring to Dr. Fontes, stated: "I think he's extremely sharp, and he raises questions that ought to be asked. I thoroughly enjoy the challenge of responding to his questions."

I think you will find Brian to be an excellent nominee and an effective member of the Bush Administration. Thank you in advance for your consideration.
